4 Citations, References, and Bibliography

4.1 Tools

- Latex citation/references/bibliography handling: biblatex (not native, bibtex, nor natbib). *.bib files are in biblatex format (not bibtex format).
- Reference management software: Zotero. Zotero exports to a biblatex *.bib file format readily.

- Zotero Add-in: [Zotero Better Bib\(La\)Tex](#). It supports custom fields (and therefore fields that Biblatex supports but Zotero doesn't natively export to, such as 'origdate' and 'shorthand') by leveraging Zotero's "extra" field.

- Citation commands. We use 'citation commands' from biblatex. We try to use 'style independent' citation commands as far as possible, to allow switching between citation and bibliography styles with ease in the latex `\usepackage[] {biblatex}` command.

4.2 Citation Command Usage

4.2.1 Basics

- Citation tracked. Note, usage of `autocite` is style independent. That is, it allows document level switching between author-date and notes-bibliography styles.

(Author Date). Usual case.

4.2.4 Dates

Original Date versus Current Date of Publication. **todo** Ensure your citation keys in Zotero use the original year, not the modern year:

For example, in Zotero my Hume entry currently has a citation key `hume_1975_enquiry_concerning_principles` and I want to end up with `hume_1751_enquiry_concerning_principles`. To do this:

- In Zotero right click on the entry > "Generate BibTex Key". "bibtex: hume_1975_enquiry_concerning_principles" will be appended to the Extra field (and so, excellently, does not interfere with existing values in the Extra field).

- Manually edit "bibtex: hume_1975_enquiry_concerning_principles" to be the desired key, "bibtex: hume_1751_enquiry_concerning_principles".
- Tab out of the Extra field to save.
- Click on some other entry. Click again on the Hume entry. This will refresh the Citation Key which now should be taking its value from the Extra Field "bibtex: origdate=1751". That is, the Citation Key should now be "hume_1751_enquiry_concerning_principles".

Date Encertainties See [Biblatex issue - Circa dates, circa date ranges, and question marked dates. #427](#).

Which date do we select as the “original date”? We can regard “original date” to be agnositic about whether this references a first published date, a last revised date (revised by the author), or a first or last written date (e.g. for a work first published many years postumously). The date we choose as the “original date” depends on the context and our purposes. For example, behold a modern publication of an earlier work by Hume ...

Original date. Reference Entry

David Hume (1751). ‘An Enquiry Concerning the Principles of Morals’. In: *Enquiries Concerning Human Understanding and Concerning the Principles of Morals*. Ed. by L. A. Selby-Bigge and P. H. Nidditch. 3rd ed. New York: Oxford University Press, 1751. ISBN: 978-0-19-824536-0. Selby-Bigge and Nidditch’s 1975 edition is based off a collection of Hume’s essays posthumously published in 1777. Selby-Bigge and Nidditch’s 1975 edition is based off a collection of Hume’s essays postumously published in 1777. However, Hume’s ‘An Enquiry Concerning the Principles of Morals’ was first published in 1751. So we’d do well to select 1751 as the “original date” (`origdate` in biblatex), because we want to report the time which most closely references Hume’s thinking as we find it expressed. We also use add a note (`annotation` in biblatex) to accompany our reference entry that explains all this (See [References](#)).

If, for a different article with a different purpose, we were interesting in differentiating between 1751 edition and the 1777 edition of ‘An Enquiry Concerning the Principles of Morals’ then we might have chosen 1777 as our “original date” (`origdate` in biblatex).

Observe, in our example, that the “original date” - 1751 - is featured and used for sorting purposes. But we also include the modern date “1975-06-12”, for it’s important to also be clear about which publication we actually use.

4.5 Command Variations: lowercase V Capitalized.

In general use the lowercase version of citation commands.

Capitalized versions of citation commands generally only capitalize a name prefix, e.g. the ‘von’ in ‘von Beethoven’, if `useprefix=true`.

E.g. If ...

We don't need to use `useprefix=true` at all, and even if we did, we could live with a lower case name prefix.

Therefore use the lowercase command version.
